Finally, I would like to wish you all a wonderful Christmas and New Year and look forward to seeing you back in school on Monday 6th January.





# **EXCITING DEVELOPMENTS**

We are thrilled to share some exciting news about our latest projects that aim to enrich the learning experiences of our pupils and foster a love of reading and creativity.



#### The Transformation of the 7FAW7

We are currently re-purposing the 7FAW7, the front 10-metre fuselage section of a retired Airbus A319 that previously flew with Air Portugal under the name of Antonio Sergio. This unique project will transform the aircraft into a cutting-edge, fully inclusive library, designed to cater for the diverse needs of our pupils.

#### **Features of the New Library:**

**Diverse Learning Materials**: The library will be equipped with a variety of resources, including books, audio stations, sensory story sacks and films, all aimed at enriching the reading experience.

**Sensory Story Sack Den**: We are excited to announce the conversion of the luggage hold into an immersive 'sensory story sack den' that promises to inspire awe and wonder among our pupils.

This innovative project has been made possible thanks to the incredible generosity of the Mark Benevolent Fund. We are also grateful to JEM Construction Ltd and Restoring Homes for their expertise in repurposing the aircraft, and we have several other exciting potential sponsors lined up!

We can't wait to open this pioneering space in the New Year, as it will provide our pupils with an inspiring environment to explore and enjoy literature.





#### **Introducing the FAWtilus**

In addition to the library project, we are proud to introduce the FAWtilus, a retired 10.15-metre freefall lifeboat, weighing approximately 10 tonnes. The name FAWtilus is derived from our school's acronym (FAW) and draws connections to maritime themes, represented by "The Nautilus," while embodying qualities such as fortitude.

#### **About the FAWtilus:**

**Emergency Lifeboat**: This self-sufficient watercraft was designed to provide a means of escape for up to 45 people from ships and offshore platforms during emergencies. It was built to withstand harsh sea conditions, ensuring a safe evacuation process.

**Recent History**: The FAWtilus was based in the North Sea and was last in service around 2022, with its engine run for approximately 300 hours from new.

Transportation and Repurposing: The lifeboat was transported from Aberdeen on April 4th, 2024, and craned onto the Loose site the following day. With the generous support of The Cobtree Charity Trust, JEM Construction Ltd has transformed it into a distinctive and playful counselling space for our staff and pupils.



These projects represent our commitment to creating enriching and supportive environments for our pupils at Five Acre Wood School. We look forward to sharing more updates as we progress and are excited to unveil these innovative spaces in the near future!

#### **FAWlife Lodge**

We are thrilled to share the fantastic news about the transformation of a three-bedroom caravan into the FAWlife Lodge, an extraordinary space designed to help our pupils develop essential life skills.

This innovative addition to Five Acre Wood School offers a real-world environment where pupils can learn and practice everyday skills, such as hoovering, making beds, preparing meals and even hosting a dinner party. These invaluable experiences are vital in helping our young people prepare for adulthood and fostering greater independence.

The creation of the FAWlife Lodge has only been possible thanks to the generosity and support of many incredible organisations. We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to J.E.C Electrical Contractors, PSM Plant Hire, and The Fascia Place, whose contributions have turned this dream into reality.

The FAWlife Lodge is more than just a building—it is a bridge to brighter futures for our pupils, offering them the tools and confidence to thrive as adults. Thank you to everyone who played a part in making this project possible!

#### **Posh Bus**

The "Poo Bus", the oldest minibus in our fleet, was on the brink of being decommissioned. Affectionately named by one of our pupils due to its condition, this vehicle was cherished by the pupil, who proposed to Peggy, our Principal, that it be repurposed into a fully accessible games room.

In response to this inspiring vision, The Variety Golf, along with the exceptional teams at HTC and Stanford Coachworks, stepped in to turn this dream into a reality. These companies are renowned for designing and building luxury minibuses for high-profile clients, creating bespoke vehicles that feature premium products and the latest technology. Through their dedicated efforts, the "Poo Bus" was transformed into the exquisite "Posh Bus" games room, equipped with all the modern amenities one could expect, including a PlayStation 5 and Apple TV!

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Jess Rider from Stamford Coaches and Justin Seal from HTC for their incredible generosity. Their commitment to going above and beyond has profoundly impacted the lives of our pupils. The "Posh Bus" returned to our site to much fanfare and excitement on November 22nd and has been in constant use ever since!

#### **Sixth Form**

Over the past two terms, a group of Sixth Form pupils have embraced their creative potential by participating in Vocational Art or engaging in Art Enrichment activities.

In Vocational Art, pupils have embarked on various projects designed to enhance their artistic skills, critical thinking, and understanding of the art world. Inspired by renowned artists like Andy Warhol, Alma Thomas, and Mondrian, they created stunning pieces that reflect their growing appreciation for and openness to the arts.

In Enrichment Art sessions, pupils experienced different medium such as collage, paint, chalk and charcoal and completed gorgeous pictures which they proudly took home.

Pupils have also been busy participating in vocational gardening and construction projects, making a significant impact on the school environment at Oxford Road.

We are so proud of all their


contributions to class this term.

Charley, Lisa and the team wish you a lovely break and we look forward to seeing you in the New Year.



#### CLASS CELEBRATIONS







SENSORY SNOWBALL







# **NOTE TO PARENTS/CARERS REGARDING MEDICATION**

To ensure that your child is given the most current prescribed medication of the correct dose and at the right time, please read these guidelines:

- 1. Please ensure that all medicines sent into school are in the ORIGINAL pharmacy containers/packaging clearly labelled with:
- Your child's name
- Name of prescribed medication
- The dosage and frequency of administration
- How medicine should be given, e.g. by mouth, via feeding tube
- Date medicine was dispensed
- Expiry Date

Any nurse will have the right to refuse the administration of medication to your child if this information is not clearly shown on the label.

- 2. Please inform the school nurse of any change to your child's regular medication, including alterations to dose, frequency or medication being stopped as advised by a doctor. These alterations need to be confirmed in writing by the prescriber. We cannot accept verbal alterations and will be unable to give an amended dose unless we have the medication in its original contained with the correct information printed on the label or receive the changes in writing from the prescriber.
- 3. If your child is prescribed emergency medication (Diazepam/Midazolam for epilepsy or Anapen/Epipen for allergy) please inform the school nurse immediately. Further information from your child's doctor will be needed regarding when the emergency medication should be given and this will be kept in school so all staff are aware of what care your child needs in an emergency.
- 4. Please ensure there is a sufficient supply of all the medicines your child needs whilst in school. We will contact you to advise when we are running low.
- 5. When sending in medication, it must <u>not</u> be put in your child's bag. Instead, it should be handed directly to a member of the class staff. If your child comes into school by taxi, the medication should be given to the escort who will then hand it to a member of the class staff when they arrive at school.
