SPORTS DAYS Sports Days were celebrated across all Five Acre Wood sites throughout June and July, giving every class the chance to join in the fun. At our Snodland site, pupils kicked off the day with morning activities including rounders, football, fencing, boccia, and sitting volleyball. In the afternoon, families joined us to cheer on the house races, enjoy a fun-filled staff race in inflatable costumes, and even take part in a family race. It was a fantastic day of teamwork, energy, and community spirit. EYFS learners enjoyed a forest school-inspired Sports Day with nature-based challenges such as stick throwing, duck and boat racing, tree trunk obstacle courses, and a "Make Your Own Medal" station. There were smiles all around as children explored, climbed, raced, and played together in the sunshine. Thank you to everyone for coming, and to our Outdoor Learning Environment (OLE) team who helped make this special day possible. Our Sensory classes got active indoors with a sensory football match using giant Kin balls, while Structured classes enjoyed carousel-style activities with favourites like the water relay. Practical and Formal groups rotated through skill-building stations that encouraged movement, teamwork, and positive peer interaction. Parent engagement was fantastic throughout all sessions, adding to the joyful atmosphere. A huge thank you to everyone who helped make our Sports Days a success. And of course, a big round of applause for all our incredible pupils—you gave it your all, and we could not be prouder!

OUTDOOR LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

You may have seen a sneak peek of our new Coppice Classroom on our social pages. Well, it is now complete – and it is looking fantastic. The parachute canopy is up, sleeper seats have been built and concreted in, the chalkboard is in place, and the little kiosk has had a makeover. A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to this transformation – including volunteers from Lloyds Bank, Zac from Grow19, our OLE team members Holly and Daniel, and the work experience pupils from Oxford Road. It's been a real team effort and a brilliant example of collaboration in action.

The hope is that the Coppice Classroom becomes a shared space for everyone using the OLE – a place for Horticulture, Forest School (more on that below), Work Experience, and our wider work -related learning provision to come together. It is an exciting development for the outdoor area. The team has also been busy preparing something very special for our Woodstock Festival – turn to page 21 to see the finished article!





The second building of our Brambles project, a key part of our long-term vision to create a work-related learning environment where pupils can build practical, employable skills in horticulture, construction, and more, is being built by Daniel and Kevin, one of our volunteers, and will eventually be painted by Preparing For Adulthood pupils from Snodland and those on work experience. What makes this project truly special is that it is predominantly being built by the pupils themselves — from the ground up. While it is still a work in progress, we are incredibly

proud of what has been achieved so far and look forward to sharing finished photos with you very soon.





Our new Forest School provision, affectionately named FAWrest School, will offer structured opportunities for pupils to learn through play and exploration, with sessions tailored to each class. Planning, adaptation, observations, and reviewing are integral parts of FAWrest School. We have created sensory stations to support exploration, including a mud kitchen and feely tables, as well as a sensory circuit area featuring rope ladders, hammocks and balance logs, and we have introduced visual aids to support pupils' communication and understanding within the environment.

This exciting new provision is already having a positive impact, and we look forward to seeing it develop even further in the months ahead.





Year 7 (Dickens and Verne classes) had brilliant days out on their school trip to Herne Bay. MATHS ACHIEVEMENTS

Congratulations to our older pupils who have achieved their Functional Skills Entry Level qualifications and those now rising to the challenge of Level 1 topics such as ratio, percentages, area and perimeter of compound shapes, and interpreting tables and charts. Their focus, determination, and willingness to tackle these challenging concepts have been outstanding.



Special thanks to our amazing Maths Mentors, who have supported younger learners with number skills and problem-solving-your encouragement has made a real difference. Thank you for being such fantastic role models!

We are also excited about our creative entries to the National Numeracy Day "Number Heroes" competition. Pupils showed creativity and a

genuine enthusiasm for maths in their projects, many of which highlight how maths plays a role in their everyday lives.

moment for all involved!




STRUCTURED SLEEPOVER

Structured play sessions with an adult have included exploring toy food and cups. Pupils showed curiosity and enjoyment as they interacted with the items, demonstrating early imaginative play skills, maintaining focus, and beginning to take turns during the activity.

Sensory-based activities, such as mark-making and playing with foam, have supported sensory regulation while promoting early fine motor and pre-writing skills. Pupils have also enjoyed problem-solving and fine motor play through cause-and-effect toys, such as placing circular rings onto a spiral rod.

To further develop independence and real-life skills, some pupils have taken part in food preparation activities — including making a sandwich by buttering bread and choosing their own filling.



ELSA CLASS

What a hot and sunny Term 6 we have had! The pupils in Elsa Class have been busy keeping cool with lots of exciting water play activities, which have brought plenty of laughter and fun. Splashing, pouring, and paddling have been a big hit with everyone!






SCHUMANN CLASS

This term, Simmonds class has been busy learning how to tell the time using analogue clocks. The children have worked hard and shown great enthusiasm reading the o'clock and half past time.



Thula class had a fabulous time at the Saplings Sports Day and everyone enjoyed all of the nature and sports activities that had been planned.


We have also been practising our shopping skills in the classroom and handing over money to buy the things we would like.

NOTE TO PARENTS/CARERS REGARDING MEDICATION

To ensure that your child is given the most current prescribed medication of the correct dose and at the right time, please read these guidelines:

- Please ensure that all medicines sent into school are in the ORIGINAL pharmacy containers/packaging clearly labelled with:
- Your child's name
- Name of prescribed medication
- The dosage and frequency of administration
- How medicine should be given, e.g. by mouth, via feeding tube
- Date medicine was dispensed
- Expiry Date

Any nurse will have the right to refuse the administration of medication to your child if this information is not clearly shown on the label.

- 2. Please inform the school nurse of any change to your child's regular medication, including alterations to dose, frequency or medication being stopped as advised by a doctor. These alterations need to be confirmed in writing by the prescriber. We cannot accept verbal alterations and will be unable to give an amended dose unless we have the medication in its original contained with the correct information printed on the label or receive the changes in writing from the prescriber.
- 3. If your child is prescribed emergency medication (Diazepam/Midazolam for epilepsy or Anapen/Epipen for allergy) please inform the school nurse immediately. Further information from your child's doctor will be needed regarding when the emergency medication should be given and this will be kept in school so all staff are aware of what care your child needs in an emergency.
- Please ensure there is a sufficient supply of all the medicines your child needs whilst in school.We will contact you to advise when we are running low.
- 5. When sending in medication, it must <u>not</u> be put in your child's bag. Instead, it should be handed directly to a member of the class staff. If your child comes into school by taxi, the medication should be given to the escort who will then hand it to a member of the class staff when they arrive at school.
