

It has been another busy term for our FAWever Choir. Not content with releasing a single earlier this year, they managed to squeeze in another before Christmas – and this time, it is entirely them. Free from autotune or overdubbed backing vocals, *This Is Me* is the choir's latest release, already having achieved an impressive number 7 spot in the iTunes Dance Chart. Pupils have worked incredibly hard this term, taking recording and filming pressures in their stride as true superstars.





The music video was filmed around the Loose school site, capturing pupils in their element alongside their friends, singing their hearts out and being unapologetically themselves. Recording also took place locally, with support from our fantastic connections to achieve the best possible sound and final result. Now familiar with the process of releasing a single, the choir embraced every challenge, and the song perfectly showcases their talent and confidence. Their unfiltered performance reinforces the message at the heart of the track: be proud, be confident, be yourself. This is them.

The pupils' confidence did not waver when they performed a live premiere of the track at the Variety Golf Christmas Dinner at the London Hilton on release day. Costa Work Placements

Opportunities for our Students

Since the opening of the FAWrient Express Training Academy café, our collaboration with Costa has gone from strength to strength — and we could not be more grateful. From sharing knowledge and expertise to providing funding, volunteers, and invaluable connections. Their continued commitment has helped us create meaningful Preparing for Adulthood pathways for our young people.



Pupils have thoroughly enjoyed visiting the café, which has supported their transitions, boosted their confidence, and enabled them to practise ordering independently, handling money, and



building friendships outside the classroom. For our older learners, the experience has provided meaningful training that they can build upon —

offering structured training and a safe space to explore what working life could look like. And, with Costa's further support, they have been able to do exactly that!

Costa has kindly taken some of our older students into local stores, offering them opportunities to experience real workplace environments first-hand. Drawing on everything they learnt aboard the FAWrient Express — along with specialist training from Esther at Hope Espresso, who helped establish our own small roastery, Platform FAW — the students have begun applying their skills in coffee making, customer service, and teamwork with growing confidence and independence. This combination of Costa-led workshops, hands-on barista training, and real business experience is helping them prepare for life beyond school in a powerful and authentic way.



We have received wonderful feedback from store managers who have praised the students' work



ethic, growth, and determination. From being given endearing nicknames, to forming new friendships, to making drinks like seasoned baristas, each student has been thriving in the working world.

We are immensely grateful to the Costa team for their ongoing support and for championing inclusive opportunities that empower young people to thrive, and proud of all of our students for their hard work. With more students set to take part in the coming months, we are excited to see what new accomplishments lie ahead — watch this space!

How Being Helpful Helps Me

I first met Matt on his second anniversary of working at Costa Coffee as a Service Engineer— although he wasn't working that day. He was on annual leave yet chose to spend it with us. After previously giving a talk to our Preparing for Adulthood students, and at a later date, returning to help build planters in the OLE, he felt a strong pull to come back once again – this time, to help build a new polytunnel.

Recently diagnosed with ADHD and autism, Matt instantly felt a connection with our pupils. They remembered him too — proudly calling him "the man with the van" after being fascinated by how he can control the temperature of his vehicle from his phone.

We spoke about everything from engineering to emotions, from fishing to figuring out life. It became clear that Matt has so much wisdom to share — practical, honest, and rooted in his own neurodiverse experiences. So, this term, we're launching a new column where Matt offers simple ideas for staying calm, regulated, and grounded in everyday life. He's also keen for me to mention that everything he writes comes purely from his perspective and lived experience (not Costa's), which makes it all the more personal. We hope you enjoy learning from him as much as we have.

Michelle Aslett, Communications Officer First, I want to say a huge thank you to Michelle for giving me the chance to write a little something in the Five Acre Wood Newsletter over the next year. I'll be sharing my experiences with ADHD and what it's teaching me about myself.

It's been a busy year at Costa Coffee, where I recently became a Lead Engineer, now supporting a team of eight. It's exciting and challenging, so I'm always finding new ways to manage the load.

FAW has become a really important emotional outlet for me. Every time I arrive, I feel a sense of calm that's hard to describe, and it always puts a smile on my face. I still remember my first visit when I delivered the "Day in the Life of a Costa Engineer" session. I met three groups of amazing young people who were getting ready for their next steps into adulthood and work. Their curiosity, humour, and enthusiasm really stayed with me.

During that visit, I also had a full tour of the school and was genuinely blown away by the dedication of the staff and how much they do to support your children as they grow and prepare for the future. It humbled me in a way I hadn't felt before.

Alongside volunteering, I've been learning about ADHD and Autism, and I'm beginning to understand myself better than ever. It feels a bit like pieces of a puzzle finally connecting—what once felt confusing or negative is slowly becoming something more positive and meaningful.

Something I've learned is that many people with ADHD feel fairness and equity very strongly. I recognise this in myself, and it's part of why helping at FAW means so much to me. Knowing I can contribute, even in small ways, helps me manage those difficult feelings and reminds me that I *am* doing something good. I sometimes wonder if that's selfish, but I've realised that the positive impact on the students far outweighs anything I get from it—and that's what truly matters.

I write this on a Sunday in November, our Christmas tree is up, my daughter Eliza and I have baked cookies, and it's freezing outside. But despite the cold, we've nearly finished the new polytunnel, put two pergola-style planters in place, and the OLE welcome area benches and signage are ready to go.

This year has taught me that volunteering is a gift—one that enriches, inspires and energises me. So I'll leave you with a question: What would you like to

learn in 2026, and why?

I hope you all have a peaceful end to the year and enjoy your time together. I'll start thinking about my next piece soon... but first, I think a cookie is calling my name.





Radio FAW All

Two of our Oxford Road students have also been enjoying their work placements, with one job entailing creating a fantastic Christmas Party playlist.

Pupils have shown increasing confidence and enthusiasm for radio, which is having a significant positive impact on their self-belief and willingness to get involved. The station has also welcomed a number of visitors, including Maidstone Riverside Rotary Club, Young Lives Foundation, Hearsay Charity, Social Enterprise Kent, Stay Connected, Kent Police, DJ Mark Anthony and Pato Banton – best known for the number one hit *Baby Come Back*.

The Core@FAW


In partnership with Core The Gym, we are creating The Core@FAW — a fully accessible gym built inside a converted shipping container at our Oxford Road site.

Practical Learning Approach

In our Practical Learning Approach, we start with core skills. Learning is planned around what pupils need most to engage with the world around them.

We focus on:

- Communication and interaction
- Independence and self-care
- Emotional wellbeing and relationships
- Functional literacy and numeracy
- Community and life skills

Subjects and topics are then used as meaningful contexts to practise and embed these skills.

We know pupils learn in different ways, so we use a flexible and responsive approach, including:

- Structured play and sensory learning
- Carousel of activities
- Practical, real-life activities
- Topic-based learning
- Repetition, routine, and clear structure

In Primary, learning is built around familiar and engaging themes such as:

- Home and family
- Celebrations and culture
- Community and people who help us
- Animals, nature, and stories
- Exploring places and the wider world

Learning is active, hands-on, and sometimes outdoors, supporting curiosity, confidence, and early independence.

In Secondary, learning develops towards adulthood through themes including:

- Identity, aspirations, and wellbeing
- Being active and healthy
- History and understanding change
- Work, careers, and independence
- Travel, transport, and navigation

These themes support communication, life skills, and preparation for the future.

Bolt Class

This term in Bolt Class we have been learning about a range of celebrations, including Diwali, Rosh Hashanah, Hanukkah and, of course, Christmas. We have used our listening and thinking skills to explore similarities between festivals from different cultures, as well as sharing our own favourite parts of the celebrations we have experienced.

The children have enjoyed a variety of practical activities, including making hotdogs and sandwiches, as well as creating some very tasty treats in the mud kitchen during forest school sessions. Alongside this, we have been working hard on recognising shapes and developing our writing and descriptive skills.











Adlington Class

What a wonderful and busy term we have had! The children have worked incredibly hard this term and we are delighted to share some of the highlights from our learning.

In Literacy we explored two inspiring books - Coming to England and The Girl at the Front of the Class. Through these stories, we talked about respecting different cultures and understanding other people's experiences. We also practised using adjectives and nouns, and the children created fantastic sentences using colourful semantics and sentence starters to help build their confidence and structure their ideas.

In Maths, we strengthened our adding and subtracting skills through practical activities and problem-solving. We also learned about the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, recognising them in real-life objects and using the correct vocabulary to describe them.

Cooking has been a real highlight! The children have grown so much in their independence and can now make pigs in blankets, pitta bread pizzas, and Rice Krispies cakes with no assistance. Our weekly trips to the supermarket have also been a big success. The children enjoyed choosing ingredients, comparing prices, and have built great confidence in using money in real-life situations.

We have continued to work on developing communication by practising asking and answering who/what/when/where questions. It has been lovely to see how comfortable and confident the children have become in conversations with one another. We also practised making phone calls safely and politely, and learned how to write using Microsoft Word, including typing sentences and saving our work.

Thank you for your continued support throughout the term. We are incredibly proud of all the progress the children have made and look forward to more exciting learning next term!


In Numeracy, we have been working on subtraction using manipulatives to help pupils secure their knowledge and

Beckham Class have had a fantastic term, taking lots of opportunities to explore our different our different topics as we




