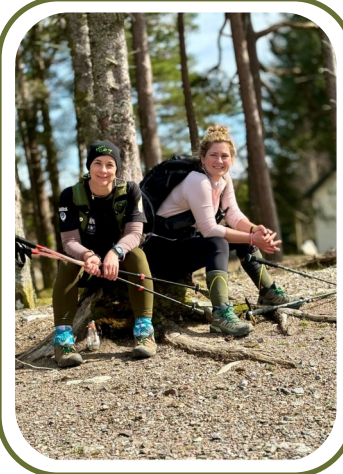
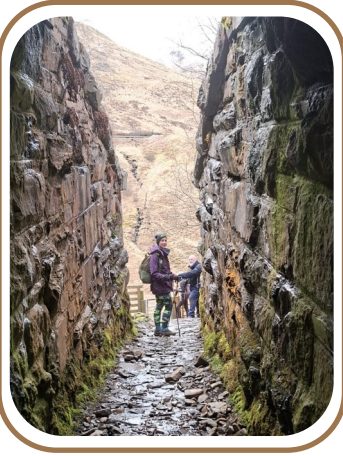

Our School FAWever Choir are preparing to release their sixth single on our very own record label, Five Acre Wood Records — and this could be our biggest release yet.

We are proud to present a powerful cover of “*The Climb*” by Miley Cyrus, featuring our special guest and friend Rachel Francis, who previously performed at our much-loved Woodstock Festival.

This inspiring song is all about perseverance, self

-belief and overcoming obstacles — a message that perfectly reflects the spirit of our pupils and wider school community. What makes this recording even more special is its honesty and authenticity. There is no autotune and no overdubbed backing vocals. What you hear are our pupils’ real voices — authentic, unfiltered and celebrated exactly as they are. Every lyric carries genuine emotion, courage and joy, making this far more than just a song.



Recorded and filmed at the Cornwallis Suite in Maidstone and the Loose site of Five Acre Wood School, the project captures something truly special: the power of music to bring people together and give every voice the opportunity to shine.

The single will be available on all major streaming and download platforms from 19th June 2026.



The vocals were first premiered at the prestigious Kipp Popert World Golf Invitational on 11th May 2026, with the

official music video receiving its premiere at South East Water HQ on 12th May 2026. The single will be released worldwide on Friday 19th June 2026 — perfectly timed ahead of Father’s Day on Sunday 21st June.

- 5. Prioritise wellbeing** - Making time for the activities, interests and quiet moments that help you feel calm and regulated is so important, especially during periods of change.

As we look ahead, there is much to look forward to — new learning opportunities, memorable experiences, and the chance to prepare positively for the next stage of your journey.

This month is a particularly busy time for me, travelling around the country for work and celebrating my birthday, but I will be following the steps above to help me stay on track as I, like you, continue my own transition.

PREPARING FAW ADULTHOOD HUB

Our Preparing for Adulthood Hub continues to grow from strength to strength, offering pupils across all sites a wide range of opportunities to develop practical, transferable life skills in engaging and meaningful environments. The hub brings together several specialist areas designed to help learners build confidence, independence and communication skills, while preparing them for future education, employment and community opportunities.

At the FAWrient Express and Platform FAW Roastery, pupils are involved in the full coffee-making process, from roasting and bagging coffee beans to serving customers in the café environment. Through this, learners develop valuable hospitality and teamwork skills, while also practising communication, money handling and customer service in a real-life setting.



Our school shop, Peggy's FAWtique, provides another opportunity for pupils to gain experience in retail and customer interaction. Students help organise stock, prepare products for sale and support customers, learning important workplace skills such as responsibility, organisation and problem solving. It currently stocks some great products including our picnic cooler backpack—perfect for summer.



Pupils have been engaging in horticulture activities within the polytunnels, which are currently looking wonderfully green and full of life. Students have been caring for tomato plants and courgettes, while also preparing colourful flowers and herbs that will be transformed into hanging baskets and seasonal displays later in the year. Many of these products will eventually be sold through Peggy's FAWtique, allowing pupils to see projects through from growth and production to sale. Outdoor learning also provides opportunities to develop wider vocational skills, including building, carpentry and teamwork projects.

Our newest addition, Made FAW You, is an exciting catering kitchen where pupils will begin developing cooking, food preparation and kitchen safety skills. During the final week of term, members of the Costa team visited pupils in the new space, which was generously funded by the Costa Foundation. You can read more about this new provision later on in the newsletter, along with exciting plans for a pop-up event to take place in Maidstone at the beginning of next term.

Looking ahead, another exciting development will be The Art of FAW, a dedicated art gallery space that will celebrate pupils' creativity and artistic talents. The space will provide opportunities for workshops, exhibitions and showcasing artwork created by learners across the school.

Importantly, all of the Preparing for Adulthood facilities are used by pupils from every site within the school. While the hub plays a vital role in supporting our older students as they prepare for adulthood and future pathways, younger pupils also benefit greatly from accessing these environments. For many learners, visiting the facilities helps develop independence and confidence as they practise safely transitioning from their classrooms to different areas around the school grounds.

The Preparing for Adulthood Hub continues to provide meaningful experiences that help pupils develop essential life skills in supportive and inspiring environments.



An update from our Designated Teacher for LAC

As part of my role supporting our Looked After Children, I regularly attend local authority network meetings to ensure we remain up to date with current guidance, local developments and best practice.

Last month, I attended the Medway network meeting for Designated Teachers supporting Looked After Children (LAC), where professionals from across the area came together to share updates, best practice and ways to improve outcomes for some of our most vulnerable learners.

One of the key topics discussed was the upcoming local government reforms. By April 2028, Kent and Medway are expected to undergo significant reorganisation, with Medway's services likely merging into a larger North Kent unitary authority. While plans are still evolving, these changes are intended to support the creation of a Kent and Medway Combined Authority, alongside an elected Mayor, helping to bring more decision-making powers closer to local communities.

Another key topic was the importance of stability, consistency and carefully planned transitions for children who are looked after and for pupils with special educational needs. For many young people who have already experienced significant change or loss, moving between classes, schools or services can feel particularly unsettling, so thoughtful transition planning remains essential in helping them feel safe, supported and ready to learn.

We also discussed the work being undertaken by Medway Virtual School to develop improved ways of capturing the pupil voice, ensuring that children and young people from a wide range of backgrounds are listened to and involved in decisions that affect them.

In addition, there was wider discussion around the increasing role of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in education. Alongside the benefits that new technology can bring, it was interesting to consider some of the environmental impacts associated with AI and digital services, reminding us all of the importance of using technology thoughtfully and responsibly. I was surprised to learn just how much water is required to cool the data centres that power AI and instant access to information — reportedly up to 22,000 cubic metres of potable water each day.

Meetings such as these are invaluable in helping us stay informed, reflect on best practice and continue strengthening the support we provide for pupils across our school community. FORMAL SECONDARY UPDATES

English

It has been a busy and productive term in English, with students across all year groups engaging in a wide range of exciting and thought-provoking learning opportunities.

Year 10 and 11 students have been working extremely hard towards their Functional Skills qualifications in reading, writing, and speaking and listening. They have shown great commitment and resilience as they continue to develop these essential skills.

As part of their studies, Year 10 students have been exploring non-fiction texts and topics, including learning about different animals. This led to thoughtful discussions surrounding fox hunting, where students were encouraged to express their opinions while considering alternative viewpoints. Many discovered that the issue was more complex than they first thought, particularly when reflecting on ethical, environmental, and cultural perspectives.

Meanwhile, Year 11 students have been studying *Stone Cold* by Robert Swindells. This powerful novel, which follows the experiences of a young man facing homelessness, has provided valuable opportunities to explore important PSHE themes. Students have engaged in meaningful discussions about the causes of homelessness, as well as the support systems and charities available to help those in need. This has been an excellent way to develop empathy and awareness of real-world issues alongside their literacy skills.

Year 8 students have been enjoying a unit focused on inspirational figures. They have been learning about individuals such as Stephen Hawking, Helen Keller, Ellie Simmonds, and Louis Braille. Through reading biographies and exploring their achievements, students have reflected on how these individuals overcame challenges and did not allow their disabilities to limit their success. This has been a truly inspiring topic, encouraging students to think about resilience, determination, and ambition.



Year 9 students have had a fantastic term exploring the magical world of Harry Potter. They examined both book and film extracts and even completed their own creative applications to attend the “Hogwarts of 2026.” This work was enriched through links with Drama, where students explored how stories such as *Harry Potter* are adapted from page to screen. They gained an appreciation for the teamwork involved in filmmaking.

To bring this learning to life, students had the exciting opportunity to visit the Warner Bros. Studio Tour London – The Making of Harry Potter. This experience allowed them to see firsthand the creativity and effort that go into producing a major film. It was a memorable and inspiring trip that students thoroughly enjoyed. Here are some of the things they had to say:

“I really enjoyed the Harry Potter trip. I also really enjoyed seeing the movies come to life and the dragon breathing fire. I also enjoyed seeing all the props and flying on a broomstick.”

“Harry Potter World was so fun. We saw loads of props and green screens. Especially when you first walk in and the dragon is hanging from the ceiling. It was a great experience. I enjoyed seeing the prosthetics where the cast gets their hair and makeup done.”

“The Harry Potter trip was amazing — more like phenomenal! If I could go every week, I would. The best part was when we got to the main hall and the bank where you could see every detail on every prop. The masks were amazing also!”

Maths



It has been another busy and successful term in Maths, with pupils continuing to work hard towards their Functional Skills qualifications. We are incredibly proud of the determination, resilience and positive attitudes shown in lessons each day.

Congratulations to our Year 10 and 11 students who have achieved Entry Level Functional Skills Maths qualifications, and to our Year 11 students who recently passed Functional Skills Level 1 Maths — a fantastic achievement.

A special thank you also goes to our Maths Mentors, who continue to support younger pupils during lessons and set an excellent example to others.

We are also looking forward to celebrating National Numeracy Day and taking part in the Number Heroes drawing competition, where this year's theme is *Maths in the Community*. Our pupils have won the competition twice before, so we are excited to see this year's entries! ICT

This term, students across the school have been developing a wide range of ICT skills. Year 9 students have been using spreadsheets to calculate shopping bills, while Year 8 have been improving their touch typing skills and learning about creating safe and secure passwords.



Key Stage 4 students have been working hard on the new ICT Digital Media qualification, building plans and using presentation skills while exploring music production using Cubase in our revamped ICT suite. Students have also enjoyed visits to and from the team at Radio FAWALL, creating jingles and content for the local community radio station. A huge thank you to Paul and Clive for all of their continued support.



Science

Science lessons this term have included a great mix of topics including pollution and upcycling, weather studies, space and the planets. Practical learning continues to play an important part in lessons, helping students develop teamwork and investigation skills.

Last terms activities included Year 9 students creating models of blood using food colouring, cereals and marshmallows, Year 10 flower dissections and students designing and building their own weather measuring instruments.

Humanities

Humanities lessons have remained practical, engaging and linked to everyday life. Year 10 students have been learning about public transport in London and studying Wales, while Year 9 have focused on local area topics. Year 11 students have been developing independence through planning trips and journeys. Through these activities, students continue to build their understanding of the world around them and their role within the local community.

Creative Arts



Year 9 students have been exploring their topic *Literacy Comes to Life* through both Drama and English lessons. Towards the end of term, students enjoyed a trip to the Harry Potter Warner Bros. Studios, where they explored the sets, props and costumes used in the films. Back in class, they continued their learning through scene work, special effects and prop making activities.



Year 11 Arts Award students have been working on their Skill Share Projects as part of their Bronze Arts Award qualification. Students planned and delivered creative sessions for other pupils, teaching skills including drawing techniques, drumming, dance and choir. We are incredibly proud of the confidence, communication and leadership skills students have developed throughout the project.



Hawking Class

Hawking Class have been busy working towards Functional Skills Maths and English qualifications, alongside building portfolios for ICT Digital Media BTEC and Bronze Awards. As Year 11 approaches, students are beginning to think about their Post-16 options while continuing to enjoy all aspects of school life.

Some students have also taken on mentoring roles in IST, Science and PE, supporting Key Stage 2 and 3 pupils. They have represented the class brilliantly and enjoyed developing their confidence and leadership skills.

As always, we continue to focus on being a kind, caring and resilient class, building independence through our daily form time sessions. We also celebrated success at the recent Golf Day at London Golf Club, where the winning student came from Hawking Class!

Shakespeare Class

Students in Shakespeare Class have enjoyed a varied and active year, including trips to Harry Potter Studios, the cinema and Kent County Showground. Several students have also tried golf for the first time, while others have taken on the challenge of the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme, recently completing their first practice walk.

Students have continued to make excellent academic progress, with all pupils achieving a Functional Skills qualification in English, Maths or both. Many students have also developed their confidence and personal talents through events such as the school talent show.

Preparing for Adulthood lessons have remained a highlight, with students working at the FAWrient Express café, taking part in cooking lessons and supporting community projects around the school. Students also raised money for their end-of-year trip to Gravity by running a car wash fundraiser. It has been wonderful to see students continue to mature into confident, polite and helpful young adults.

Costa Volunteering Day

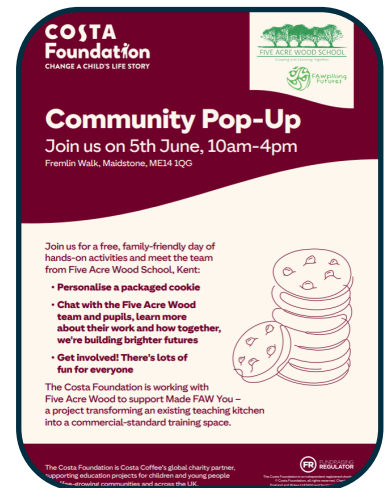

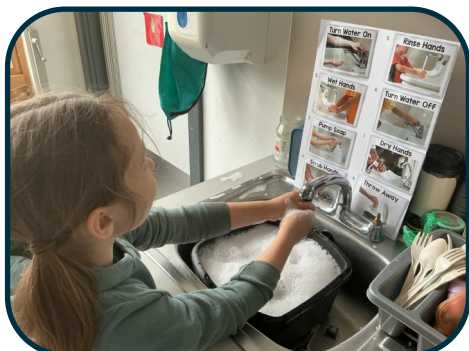

Beethoven Class



This term, pupils in Beethoven Class have been developing their independence and taking part in activities designed to support a range of important life skills. They have become increasingly confident at following classroom schedules and routines and have demonstrated fantastic skills when carrying out everyday tasks such as washing up, tidying litter, and preparing food.
